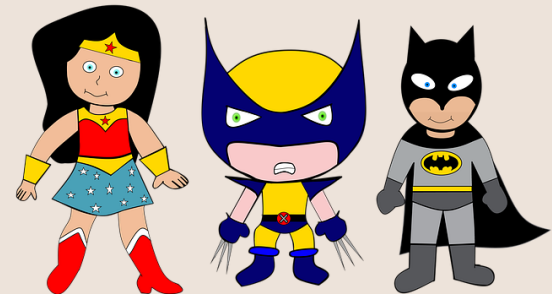


Promoting your child's independent skills



Get your child to practise some of these skills over the coming months:

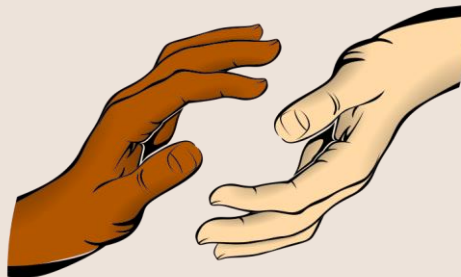
- Putting on and taking off their coats

- Recognising their written name



How you can help

Parents can help promote their child's independence by:

- Choosing shoes/runners with Velcro fasteners
- Choosing coats with zip fasteners
- Choosing elasticated trousers
- Choosing easy open lunchboxes and beakers.
- Label all of your child's belongings so that they are able to find what belongs to them
- "Don't just do something, sit there"



Settling in to School Life

We take time to help the children :

- Get familiar with their new surroundings
- Get to know their new classmates and teacher
- Develop routines e.g. lining-up, yard, home-time
- Visit other areas of the school like the front building, Astro and yard

Lunches

- Healthy Eating Policy
- First 2 Weeks: Parents/Guardians provide lunch for the first two weeks.
- We will set up an account with Irish School Meals for their hot lunches thereafter
- Beakers/Drinks – Make sure they are leak-proof and that your child can open and close them independently
- Lunchboxes – Re-sealable and make sure they can be opened and closed independently
- Make sure all lunchboxes and beakers are clearly labelled with your child's name
- Fruit – please peel and cut into smaller pieces, especially grapes

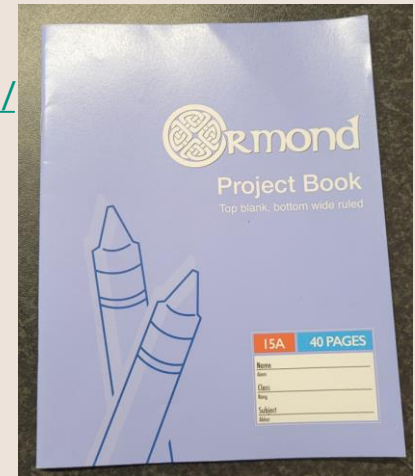

The First Day

- Talk to your child about their first day and any worries they may have. You can show them [this video](#) during the summer
- Explain to your child that it is time to leave and you will be back soon to collect them
- If your child is upset – trust the teacher, they are very experienced at comforting an anxious child
- Ensure you are on time for collecting your child from school



Dropping and Collecting

- Children are dropped and collected at the double doors beside room 10
- Parents explain to the teacher who should collect their child.
- If there is a change to this parents should phone, email or send an Aladdin notice.
- Finish at 12:30 until Friday September 5th
- 2pm days start on Monday the 8th of September.

Wellbeing

- Play – encourage your child to play as this helps with their learning and social and emotional development
- Building resilience – carefully scaffold experiences where your child is slightly out of their comfort zone, but not to the point that makes them anxious or overwhelmed
- Feelings – talk about and name your child's feelings. [See Zones of Regulation](#)
- Kindness – encourage your child to be kind to others
- Transitioning to School – talk to your child all about their new school





Hygiene

Good hygiene is always important but it is particularly important for Junior Infants. You can help to keep your child and school safe and healthy by practising these hygiene routines with your child:

- Encourage and practise independent toileting
- Practise flushing the toilet
- Practise washing hands with soap
- Encourage your child to sing 'Happy Birthday' while washing their hands
- Practise using and disposing of a tissue correctly
- Encourage your child to use the correct sneeze and cough etiquette

- Fosters children's well-being, self-confidence and sense of belonging
- develops children's sense of personal responsibility for their own behaviour and actions
- promotes children's self-awareness and understanding by helping them to manage their own feelings, to recognise and appreciate individual abilities, and to cope with change of various kinds

Aladdin is used by Irish primary schools to securely communicate and share information with parents and guardians.

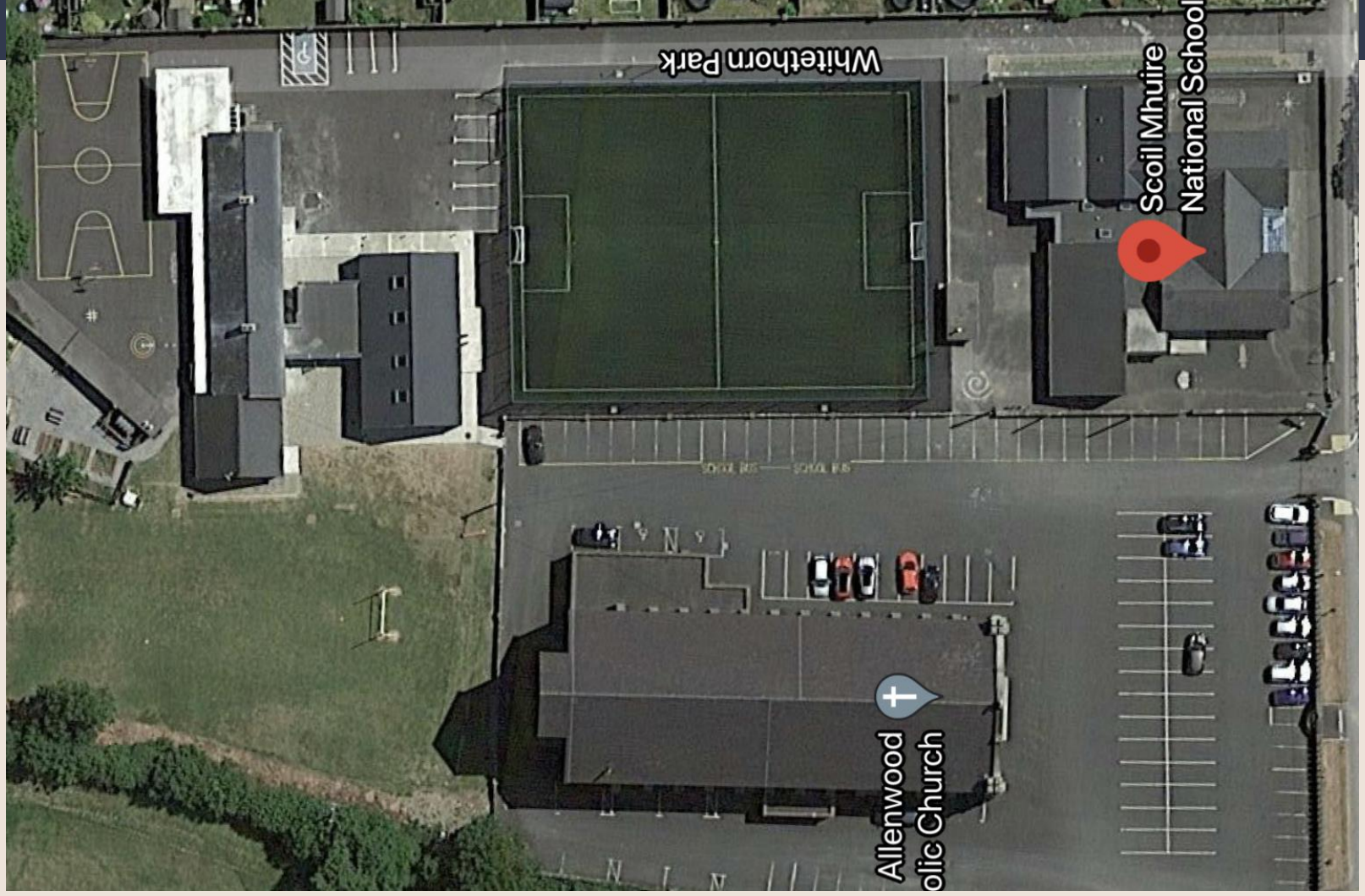
Our school has Aladdin Connect for the parents/guardians of children in our classes.

Aladdin Connect is a fantastic way to enhance a school's communication with its parents. It enables parents to stay connected and informed about their child's education by:

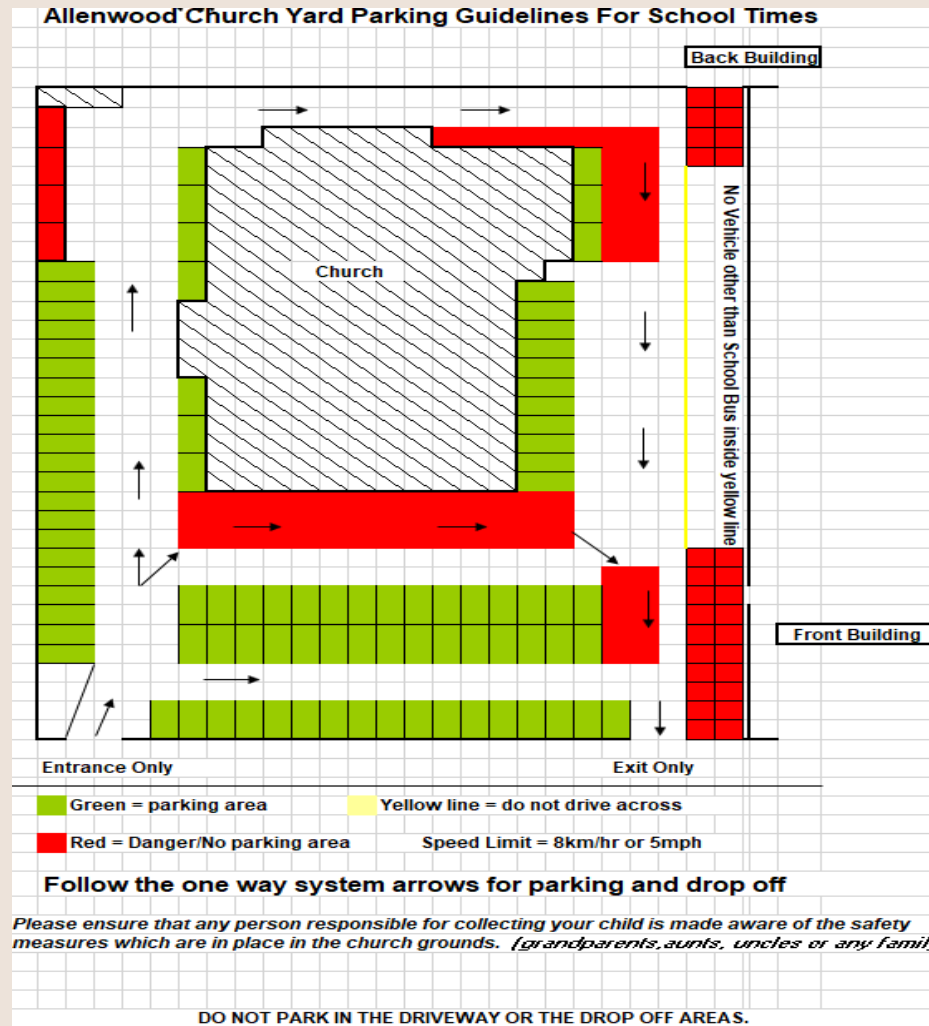
- Ensuring schools has their most up to date contact information.

Map of School

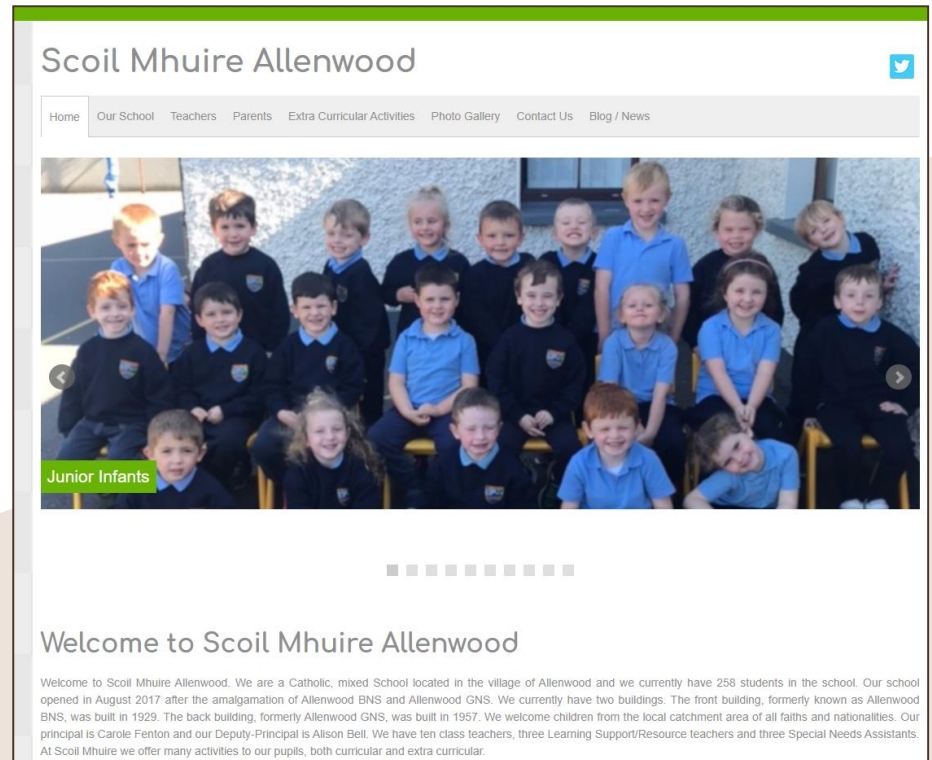


Map of Churchyard Carpark

The What, Why and How of your child's learning

NCCA

Junior and senior infants 1

A summary of your child's learning in junior and senior infants in the 6 curriculum areas is provided below, along with some suggestions on how you can support your child's learning at home.

LANGUAGE

Through language, your child learns to communicate in English and in Irish. Your child learns to listen, to speak, to read and to write in both languages. These language skills provide a basis for learning in all other areas of the curriculum.

The Language Curriculum emphasises developing listening and speaking skills in preparation for beginning reading and writing. Through listening and to talk about their thoughts and feelings. They also learn to listen to each other.

Children become more aware of letters and words when they see writing all around them, for example, on the classroom walls and in the class library. Children listen to and create stories from big books (large books with big pictures and text) with the teacher and other children. This gives them the chance to talk about the story and to ask and answer questions. From these early activities, your child learns important messages about reading and writing: he/she learns that words run from left to right on a page and have meaning, that pictures help to tell a story. Children also learn that different letters have different sounds by playing rhyming games with words and by using their listening skills to hear different sounds in words. Making marks, scribbling, drawing and painting with paint, crayons, pencils, pens and chalk, also helps your child to begin reading and writing.

Your child will start reading graded books chosen with the teacher, and will learn to form letters correctly and be encouraged to write short pieces, when he/she is ready to do so.

Waiting until your child is ready, helps your child to experience greater success in reading and writing right from the beginning. On the other hand, if your child begins before he/she is ready to do so, he/she may not experience that same success.


You can help your child to learn at home by:

- singing songs, nursery and counting rhymes in both languages with your child and encouraging your child to teach you songs and rhymes that he/she has been learning in school. Children love action rhymes so help your child to make up actions to go with the words or ask your child to show you actions he/she has learned
- bringing your child to the library and sharing books with your child, for example, ask your child to predict what the story will be about from looking at the picture on the front cover
- listening to and talking with your child and encouraging him/her to tell you more about different things that interest him/her, for example, what his/her favourite toys are and why.

What your child is learning at school and at home

Match - objects that go together eg socks, shoes

Sort - groups of objects eg put all blue blocks together

Say the Numbers - 1 to 10

Recognise written numbers - 1 to 5

Write the numbers - 1 to 5

Tell at a glance the number of objects in a group up to 5

Make and count a group of objects up to 5

Add two groups of objects to a total of 5

Count how many are left in a group when some are taken away


Recognise simple patterns using shapes, beads etc.

Sort and name shapes - square, triangle, circle and rectangle

Compare objects - light and heavy, long and short etc

Talk about time - before and after, early and late etc.

Recognise and use coins - up to 5 cents
